BEDFORD DIVISION OF FIRE – 2014 ANNUAL REPORT

OVERVIEW

The Bedford Fire Department responded to **2409** calls in 2014. EMS (ambulance) accounted for **1893** calls and alarms (calls requiring the response of an engine) for the remaining **516** calls. There was a **4%** increase in total call volume.

EMS calls increased by **5%** and alarms increased by **.2%** from the previous year.

The average response time for all calls (in Bedford, Automatic Aid and Mutual Aid) in 2014 was **3 minutes and 59 seconds**. On average, firefighters responded to **6.6** calls per day.

PERSONNEL

There were **27** members assigned to three different shifts, **2** Chief Officers and **1** Administrative Assistant in the fire department.

Lieutenant Terry Salvi retired from the department after **33** years of service.

Firefighter Nick Schkurko retired from the department after **18** years of service.

Firefighter Ryan Turk was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant.

Joe Kucera and Steve Bowser were appointed to the rank of Firefighter/Paramedic.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS)

Emergency medical runs accounted for **78.5%** of the total call volume in 2014. The 1893 EMS requests for service in 2014 was the highest volume the paramedics have experienced since 2008.

FIRE & RESCUE

Figure 2 details the **2409** incidents on which a piece of Bedford Fire apparatus responded in 2014 based on NFIRS (National Fire Incident Reporting System) classifications. Figure 2 shows the breakdown of incidents handled by the department.

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

Structure Fires

Bedford Firefighters operated at **36** structure fire incidents; **12** in Bedford and provided assistance at **24** automatic and mutual aid fires.

Total fire loss for 2014 was **\$429,100 (+32%)**.

Structure fires accounted for **\$230,100 (46%)** of the total loss dollars in 2014. There were **(3)** structure fires that resulted in an estimated dollar loss greater than \$25,000

The remaining **\$199,000 (54%)** was the result of vehicle fires and/or other non-structural incidents.

There were no civilian fire fatalities in 2014.

Rescue/Special Hazards Response

Firefighters responded to a multitude of emergencies other than structure fires/fire alarms during 2013. The department is expected to successfully mitigate hazardous materials emergencies, vehicle extrications, rope rescues, confined space incidents to name a few.

Firefighters responded to **106 (+8.5%)** incidents involving hazardous conditions (ex; natural gas leaks, carbon monoxide alarms, electrical emergencies, etc.).

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The Department responded to **15 (+33%)** incidents classified as “special type” incidents. These included vehicle extrications, park rescues, elevator rescues and incidents involving regional technical rescue teams.

FIRE PREVENTION

Assistant Fire Chief Shawn Solar was responsible for operations within The Fire Prevention Bureau. The Prevention Bureau includes Code Enforcement (fire inspections), Public Education, and Fire Investigation.

Code Enforcement

There were 12 Certified State of Ohio Fire Safety Inspectors on staff. Ten of the inspectors worked as shift assigned firefighter/paramedics in the department and assisted in the vitally important practice of conducting fire safety inspections.

In addition to fire inspections the Bureau witnessed **11** fire hood suppression system tests. A hood suppression system is required (bi-annually) in any facility/business in which cooking creates grease laden vapors. It is designed to quickly extinguish a grease fire using dry chemicals (powder).

A total of **27** fire alarm/sprinkler/fire pump tests were conducted as well. Per Code any structure that has a fire alarm and/or sprinkler system must be tested on an annual basis.

Public Education

Public education continued to be a top priority for members of the department. It was our goal to prevent fires, accidents and other emergencies. Public education provided an avenue toward achieving that goal. Educational activities are tailored to be delivered to pre-school aged children as well as senior citizens and all ages between.

The topic of the 2014 Fire Prevention Week “Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month” was presented to school aged children during the first week of October 2014.

Fourteen Fire Safety Presentations were delivered during the year.

Four fire extinguisher training sessions were conducted for local facilities and businesses. These sessions stressed the importance of proper utilization of these

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potentially life and property saving devices. The classes consisted of classroom and hands-on evolutions.

Juvenile Fire Setters Program

The Juvenile Fire Setters Program is designed to provide interventions and counseling for children, usually between the ages of 4 and 12, who have been involved in setting fires.

Firefighter Chris Neading and Lt. Ryan Turk are responsible for this program.

There were 4 Juvenile Fire Setters referrals and no consultations in 2014.

Fire Investigation

It is the responsibility of the Fire Department to determine cause and origin of all fire incidents. Some fires require additional investigation.

Lieutenant Ryan Turk is certified as the Department's Fire Investigator.

In 2014 Fire Investigator Turk investigated 3 of the 12 structure fire incidents in Bedford. None of the incidents were determined to be intentional (arson). Lt. Turk was consulted via telephone on numerous other fire incidents in 2014.

PUBLIC SAFETY PROGRAMS

Smoke Detector Program

Utilizing generous donations from local businesses the department was able to fund its' Smoke Detector Program. Bedford residents who have no smoke detectors in their homes were able to contact the department to obtain a detector and if needed have the detector installed by firefighters. A portion of the donations were utilized for smoke detector battery replacement program.

In 2014, as a result of the Smoke Detector Program, **76** smoke detectors were distributed to Bedford Residents as well as numerous replacement batteries. Eight hundred and forty eight (848) residents have received a free smoke detector over the past six years.

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CPR and AED Program

Firefighter/Paramedics Stephanie Balochko and Joe Sisak continued to teach a fire department sponsored CPR and Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) program.

The classes were available to residents, local businesses and organizations and were taught in accordance with the guidelines of the American Heart Association.

Firefighters Balochko and Sisak instructed **60** students on the proper CPR techniques and AED usage. The information was delivered in multiple classroom sessions.

TRAINING

Lieutenant Brian Harting and Lieutenant Jeff Diederich split duties as the Department's Training Officers. They were responsible for coordinating both on-duty and off duty fire and rescue training. They insured that firefighter's certifications remained current throughout the year.

There were **10** Certified State of Ohio Fire Instructors in the Division of Fire in 2014.

Lieutenant Greg Miller and Lieutenant Dan Dopslaf served as the Department's EMS Coordinators. They were responsible for in-house training for paramedics and EMTs. They were also responsible for any EMS related issues that occur (equipment, protocols, etc.) in relation to the department.

Paramedics are certified in Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Basic Trauma Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support and Basic Life Support.

There were **401** training sessions conducted in the Division in 2014.

Figure 3 details the training categories that were the focus of training for members of the department in 2014.

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

Fire Training

There were **201** training sessions dedicated to fire specific training.

Training topics included, but were not limited to, Building Construction, Fire Behavior, Strategy / Tactics, Incident Command, Pump Operations, Aerial Operations, and SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus). These training classes and time spent were vital to the delivery of safe, aggressive, effective and efficient services when the firefighters were requested to respond by those we serve.

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Rescue/Special Hazards Training

In 2014 the department continued our commitment to be ready to effectively mitigate any type of rescue/special hazards emergency that may occur. A total of 45 sessions were spent training for these special rescue scenarios.

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EMS Training

Bedford Firefighters participated in **87** sessions of on-duty EMS Training in 2014.

Training included 12 lead EKG analysis, pediatric care, extensive pharmacological training as well as trauma, advanced and basic life support, and protocol review.

Figure 6 shows the breakdown of the training department paramedics and EMTs participated in during 2014.



Building Tours

Shift personnel conducted **93** building tours in 2014. The firefighter hours spent on these tours were in addition to the firefighter hours that were dedicated toward on-duty training.

The tours provided firefighters an opportunity to familiarize themselves with building layout, construction and other nuances of structures in the community. This information can then be applied to gain an understanding of how fire will affect the structure, strategy/tactics, and what obstacles crews may face in reduced visibility conditions should an emergency occur.

These tours and the knowledge gained have a profound effect on civilian and firefighter safety when operating at emergency fire scenes.

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FIREFIGHTER WELLNESS AND SAFETY

Historically, the leading causes of firefighter deaths and injuries, annually, are cardiovascular episodes (heart attack or stroke). In an attempt to prevent becoming a statistic Bedford Firefighters incorporated stamina and strength training as part of their daily routine. Firefighters were able to insure that they were physical able to deliver quality service in an efficient manner to our customers.

Members logged 1915 (+10%) firefighter hours of on-duty health and wellness activities in 2014.

SPECIALIZED REGIONAL RESPONSE TEAMS

Due to the complex nature of certain low frequency-high risk emergencies and limited resources of individual departments specialized regional teams have been formed. These teams are composed of members from numerous departments in the region. Departments can activate these teams as necessary. Firefighters from Bedford served on these teams. Not only did this show a commitment to regionalization but these firefighters were able to provide valuable skills and knowledge to entire Bedford Fire Department. This enabled first responding units and firefighters from our department to more efficiently begin rendering care to victims during these unique rescue scenarios.

Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT)

The team assists in mitigation of incidents involving hazardous (chemical, biological, etc.) agents. The team is also trained to perform confined space rescues and handle Weapons of Mass Destruction incidents.

Firefighter Chris Neading, Lieutenant Dave Moore and Lieutenant Jeff Diederich represented the Department as members of the Chagrin/Southeast Region Hazardous Materials Team.

There were no incidents in Bedford which required the team activation.

Team members from the Bedford Fire Department responded (regionally) to 1 incident with the team.

Hillcrest Technical Rescue Team (HTRT)

This technical rescue team performs specialized rescues such as high angle rope rescue, trench rescue, confined space, swift water rescue, ice rescue, and dive rescues.

Lieutenant Brian Harting, Lieutenant Jeff Diederich and Firefighter Marc Latkovic operated as members of the HTRT regional team in 2013.

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Team members from the Bedford Fire Department responded (regionally) to 10 incidents with the team.

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE

The following represents the preventative maintenance repairs completed for the Fire Department Fleet in the year 2014, from January 1 to December 31. The program consists of two key people; Pat Guhde and Rick Gromovsky, working under Chief Nagy, to provide quality inspection and maintenance in an effort to avoid breakdowns and costly repairs. This program follows the NFPA criteria and meets or exceeds each manufacturer's minimum recommendations. Pat, Rick, Frank, and Bryan attended classes and training sessions and are active holders of the industry's testing standards, which certify technicians for the state of Ohio. This organization is the Emergency Vehicle Technician Certification Commission Inc. (EVTCC). Together with the EVTCC certifications, the ASE certification's and the tribal knowledge of all the individuals involved, we at the City of Bedford rarely send non-warranted maintenance or repairs to outside vendors.

Preventative Maintenance is performed both in station at the Fire Department and at the Service Department. This saves the community's tax dollars, as well as having the apparatus and its equipment remain in this City for the citizens, always in a state of readiness. Pat has the task of keeping the process on track, performing daily repairs in station and procuring the correct parts for the next maintenance event. Heavy maintenance and repairs are carefully planned with Rick and his crew, and the apparatus is then repaired at the Service Department, where it is an "all hands on deck event." This minimizes the down time and any interruption in the capabilities of the Fire Department or the Service Department. Maintenance records are as important as the repair itself, and with the close relationship between Pat and Rick, no repair goes undocumented.

Fire Station & Equipment = 19 repair orders completed

Staff Cars and Trailer = 42 repair orders completed 15 of them done in station

Ladder 11, 1992 Simon Duplex LTI Ladder = 19 repair orders completed, pump tested in August, 12 of them done in station

Engine 12, 2007 E-One Cyclone II Pumper = 18 repair orders completed, pump tested in August, 2 minor deficiencies noted but all corrected 16 of them done in station

Engine 13, 1996 Pierce Quantum Pumper = 27 repair orders completed, pump tested in August, 0 deficiencies noted 21 of them done in station

Squad 17, 2005 Freightliner / Horton Ambulance = 8 repair orders completed, All 8 of them completed in station

Squad 18, 2000 Freightliner / Horton Ambulance = 4 repair orders completed, All 4 of them completed in station

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Squad 19, 2012 Freightliner / Horton Ambulance = 28 repair orders completed, **23 of them done in station**

Command post, 1992 Spartan / Enterprise Coach = 3 repair orders completed, **0 of them done in station**

Some of the notable challenges that we had last year with the fleet were the paint and corrosion warranty repair on Engine 12, and the subsequent internal motor problem that had to be repaired while it was in Buffalo, New York.

Below are some pictures of the paint work that came out very nicely and was covered under the manufacturer's paint warranty, and the motor work that was needed due to an emissions component failure and allowing antifreeze to get into the motor cylinders, which damaged the internal motor components. The component was the EGR cooler, and it had been checked and replaced in the past and was under warranty at that time, but this failure fell out of the warranty period by a year and 2 months.



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Also in 2014 we took care of some needed restoration work needed on Ladder 11. This work was done in-house at the Service Department over the course of four days. We were able to save the City approximately \$4000 by doing the job ourselves. Over the course of the project we replaced the main body supports that were rusted from the splash of the rear wheels, and also took care of some rust jacking on the PS and DS brackets for the Aerial Torque Box. These brackets were being watched and were also noted to be an issue in the 3rd party certification testing that the truck and aerial go through every year. Overall for the vehicle, which is a 1992, it should continue to serve us well for many more years to come. Replacement cost of this specialized vehicle would be a minimum of \$900,000.



In summary, the past year, the Fire Department, which has the most expensive and technically complex fleet out of all of the City's Departments, and its Maintenance Department, is very efficient and effective with the tax dollars it operates with. We continue to strive and succeed to give the best value to the residents of this City, and make cost saving decisions each and every day.

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ACHIEVEMENTS

ISO Rating Lowered

ISO collects information on municipal fire-protection efforts in communities throughout the United States. In each of those communities, ISO analyzes the relevant data using our Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS). We then assign a Public Protection Classification from 1 to 10. Class 1 generally represents superior property fire protection, and Class 10 indicates that the area's fire-suppression program doesn't meet ISO's minimum criteria.

By classifying communities' ability to suppress fires, ISO helps the communities evaluate their public fire-protection services. The program provides an objective, countrywide standard that helps fire departments in planning and budgeting for facilities, equipment, and training. And by securing lower fire insurance premiums for communities with better public protection, the PPC program provides incentives and rewards for communities that choose to improve their firefighting services.

The Bedford Fire Department had been classified as a "4" for the past 20 plus years. As a Department we were able to lower our community rating to a "3."

Nationwide 49,010 Fire Departments are classified by ISO. Of these departments only 3,220 have achieved a classification of 3 or less.

Overview

Chief Kris Nietert

The following report is compiled to give a brief synopsis of the Police Departments activities. More detailed reports are available from the Division of Police.

CALLS FOR SERVICE: CAD Reports are generated to document all Department activity.

INCIDENT REPORTS: Incidents Reports are generated to reflect those CAD's that involved a Part I offense, arrest, significant event, or incidents that involved additional follow-up investigation.

PARKING CITATIONS: Decreased from 759 in 2013, to 658 in 2014

We continue to use the criminal nuisance ordinance to hold homeowners accountable for continued police response to their residence. In 2014 the ordinance was expanded to include any offense excluding traffic as a nuisance. The ordinance also expanded the fines and allowed the fines to be assessed to the property taxes.

In 2014, Sgt. Ed Mementowski, and Ptlm. Dave Eschweiler retired. Det. Sgt. Brian Byard resigned to become the Chief of Aurora PD. Justin Sisak continues to serve in the Army Reserves through June of 2015. Ptlm. Keith Collins, in anticipation of an early 2015 retirement, stepped down as the school resource officer (SRO). Ptlm. Sean Francis has assumed Keith's duties as the SRO. Det. Dennis Bergansky was promoted to sergeant.

Construction at the Southeast Emergency Communication Center (SECC) is near completion. There have been some minor setbacks that have delayed the anticipated December 2014 opening. The opening is scheduled for February 2015.

We will continue to align our traffic enforcement goals with the UHHS OVI Task Force traffic enforcement objectives. The \$6000 Robbery/Auto Theft grant received in 2014 appears to have played a role in reducing robberies by 10% and auto thefts by 54%. Sgt. Mike Stask continues to seek and apply for grants.

We had an officer involved shooting at the end of December. The investigation is coming to a close and we anticipate the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury will review the findings early in 2015.

Whatever the challenge, the men and women of the Bedford Police Department will continue to provide quality service to the residents and continue to maintain, and improve, the quality of life within the community.



Animal Control
Deputy Chief Marty Stemple

In 2014, The City of Bedford employed three part-time animal wardens, Steve Fine, Robert Kelly, and Al Benda. We provide service to Bedford and Bedford Hts. Mon-Fri 0800-1600 and Sat-Sun 0800-1200, for a total of 48 hours per week. Bedford Hts. pays half of our expenses for this service.

The truck, a 2008 Chevrolet, went into service in October 2008. The truck is equipped with a mobile data terminal, allowing the animal wardens to receive call data and clear calls from the truck.

The animal wardens responded to 1058 calls for service in Bedford. Calls for service included but are not limited to dogs running at large, animal bite reports, vicious dogs, barking dogs, nuisance animals, and requests for animal traps.

The animal wardens provide information to residents regarding nuisance animals to help discourage the presence of these animals at their residence. Traps are available to residents of Bedford and Bedford Hts. Trapped nuisance wildlife cannot be released and must be euthanized to avoid the spread of rabies and other diseases. Skunks, possums, and raccoons are considered nuisance animals. The animal wardens have been trained in techniques to properly euthanize animals and dispose of their carcass.



Auxiliary Police

The Bedford Auxiliary Police Force has an authorized strength of 30 officers. In 2014, four new auxiliaries were sworn in putting the group currently at 20 members.

The Auxiliaries serve to supplement and support the mission of the Bedford Police Department. They continue to play an instrumental role in addressing complaints regarding juveniles and "Quality of Life" issues. They participate in a "Juvenile/Quality of Life Patrol" that focuses on problems like juveniles walking, riding and/or skateboarding in the streets. They patrol the City's parks, including the skateboard park. They also look to address "Quality of Life" issues like junk motor vehicles, trashcans left out or trash put out early, and they issue Warning Notices when applicable.

In 2014, the Auxiliaries continued with the Night Patrol Detail in order to increase police visibility and to deter the thefts from automobiles that our residents and businesses were experiencing. They also patrolled neighborhoods during the Holiday Season to prevent burglaries and thefts.

The Auxiliaries also handle traffic control for the Bedford Foundation Classic Run/Walk, the Memorial Day Parade, and the Fourth of July Parade. They check homes for residents that are on vacation. The Auxiliaries direct traffic and monitor parking for the various high school athletic events, and they assist with security for the events on the Square and other various civic events.

The Auxiliaries fulfilled their training goal for 2014. They participated in defensive tactics training and a refresher in pepper spray. The training goal for 2015 is to have scenario-based training to evaluate their decision-making.

The Auxiliaries worked a total of 2,504.30 hours in 2014. The Auxiliaries are required to work a minimum of 60 hours per year, 20 hours in the first half of the year and 20 hours in each of the third and fourth quarters.

The Auxiliaries look forward to 2015, and are ready to continue their efforts in helping the citizens feel safe and secure in their neighborhoods.



Communications

Deputy Chief Marty Stemple

The communications center consists of two workstations where our dispatchers take telephone and 911 calls, communicate via radio with police, fire, service, and surrounding communities. Independence Communications maintains the Moducomm radio console system.

Along with handling radio and telephone traffic, the communications center also houses the main control panel for the detention facility. The dispatcher also monitors 5 television screens, representing over fifty color cameras throughout the complex.

We share a frequency with Walton Hills and Oakwood Village.

The Southeast Emergency Communication Center (SECC) was formed with Bedford Hts, Garfield Hts, and Maple Hts. Dispatch consolidation efforts are underway. We hope to see the regional dispatch center operational in 2015.



Detective Bureau

Detective Shawn Klubnik
(Office in Charge)

The Bedford Police Department Detective Bureau currently consists of (2) Two Detectives and one Secretary. Detectives include Detective Shawn Klubnik and Detective Buck Kidd. Janey Mackiewicz is the Detective Bureau secretary.

During the year 2014, Detective Sergeant Brian Byard was the Officer-In-Charge of the Detective Bureau. Near the end of the year, Brian accepted the position of the Chief of Police for The Aurora Police Department.

After serving nearly (20) twenty years in the Detective Bureau, Dennis Bergansky was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and is currently assigned to the Patrol Division.

Also aligned with the Detective Bureau is the School Resource Officer Sean Francis, Seale Narcotics Detective Brian Sara and Juvenile Diversion Coordinator Penny Jarrell.

The primary function of the Detective Bureau is to follow-up and investigate a variety of crimes included but not limited to homicides, robberies, burglaries, sexual assaults, thefts, internet crimes and crimes occurring by way of social media.

The Detective Bureau is responsible for maintaining the evidence room. Detective Klubnik is the Property Room Manager. Detectives are also responsible for court appearances as well grand jury testimony involving felony and misdemeanor cases. Detectives work closely with the uniformed patrol officers, victims of crime, and prosecutors to ensure a successful prosecution of the offender(s).

Detectives attend numerous training and schools throughout the year to remain up to date on new crime trends as well as technology advancements.

Detectives Klubnik and Kidd are actively involved and maintain lead positions on the C.A.R.T. Team for Missing Persons and the C.I.T. Team for Hostage Negotiations.

There were (132) ADULT AND JUVENILE Cases investigated and forwarded to the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury and the Juvenile Court for the year 2014.

The following details highlight some of the major cases

- On January 27, 2014, a local resident (Jina Sichi) was a victim of a hit/run. Through investigation it was learned the driver, (Sandra Auletta), failed to stop after the accident, but turned herself in to police a few days later. She plead to Failure to Stop after an accident to exchange identity. The Agg Vehicular Assault charge was NOLLED. She was sentenced to one day in jail at CCSO. Her driver's license was suspended for (6) six months with work privileges only. Note: Ms Sichi died a few weeks prior to the conclusion of this case from a suspected drug overdose while in the City of Maple Heights.
- On February 10, 2014, while at 717 Lincoln Blvd. an infant baby boy was found unresponsive, and all life sustaining measures were unsuccessful in reviving him. Through investigation, it was learned both parents were actively taking illegal drugs and their other toddler children were turned over to the Dept. of Children & Family Services. The infant's cause of death was questionable and both his parents (Prochazka and Weiland) were charged with Involuntary Manslaughter and Child Endangerment. Prochazka was also charged with an illegal firearm. The case is set for Pretrial, 03/12/2015 at County Court. Updates will follow...
- On February 24, 2014, a sixteen-year old developmentally challenged male, advised his mother he was being sexually assaulted at the Cee Ray Motel by a male he met on social media. Through investigation, (Kenneth Sanders) was arrested and charged with Rape and Felonious Assault. His next Pretrial is 02/23/2015 at County Court. Updates will follow...
- On April 11, 2014, an adult female patron of the Tavern Off Broadway was sexually assaulted and possibly drugged. Through investigation it was learned, an illegal Mexican male (Daniel Meza) was charged with Rape, Sexual Assault, Kidnapping, & Robbery. On September 03, 2014, Meza plead guilty to a felony three Sexual Battery and a felony three Robbery. He was sentenced to L.C.I. for 21 months on both charges, and (5) five years of mandatory Post Release Control Probation. He is a TIER III SEX OFFENDER/CHILD VICTIM OFFENDER REGISTRANT; LIFETIME IN PERSON VERIFICATION EVERY 90 DAYS.

- On April 26, 2014, another report of sexual assault and rape was reported from a juvenile female reporting (Thomas Grove) was inviting them to his home through social media and forcing them to have sex with him. Through investigation and over the past two years officers and detectives have charged Grove with Rape, sexual assault, and battery on five different cases involving (5) different victims. He is currently scheduled for a PRETRIAL on February 17, 2015, after numerous failed competency hearings and a motion for an independent psychiatric exam was granted by the County Court. Updates to follow...
- On May 26, 2014, a male was reported to police arguing with patrons at Mugg's Bar, and carrying a gun. Through further investigation it was learned the male (Raymond Daley) was in possession of a concealed loaded semi auto pistol with extra magazines. He was arrested and charged with possession of a firearm in a bar, CCW, using weapons while intoxicated, Violating a Protection Order, and Inducting Panic. On 12/09/2014, he plead guilty to using weapons while intoxicated (M-1) with forfeiture of the weapon. All other charges NOLLED. The handgun was ordered forfeited to the state. He was sentenced to Adult Probation for one year with sanctions.
- On June 01, 2014 at approx. 0445 hrs. a female employee of Walmart reported an unknown male customer was "peeping" on her in the female restroom and had attempted to physically force her inside the stall, but she was able to push him away and contact store employees. He was arrested and charged with felony Abduction. The case is pending in the Cuyahoga County Court. Updates to follow...
- On June 16, 2014, several businesses in the city reported VANDALISM and PROPERTY DAMAGE to tires, door handles, blue plastic bags containing flour placed in truck's engines through the carburetor. The suspect was captured on video surveillance. Through investigation, (Louis Bryant) was arrested and charged with B&E, Vandalism, Criminal Trespass and Criminal Damage. Trial is set for 02/09/2015 at County Court.
- On June 25, 2014, the detective bureau conducted a traffic stop on a suspicious vehicle. Through investigation, it was learned (Charlezetta Gore) was in possession of a large amount of controlled pills, marijuana, and drug paraphernalia. She was charged with Drug Trafficking, Drug Possession, and Possession of Criminal Tools. She had plead to Drug Trafficking (F-3). The State is forfeiting the cash (\$2,985.00 and the miscellaneous property). The jewelry will be returned to the defendant. Sentencing is set for 02/09/2014. Updates to follow...

- On August 10, 2014, the Sunoco at 667 Northfield Road reported a breaking and entering. Through further investigation and a fellow investigation with WHPD, MH, and GH (4) suspects were observed on store video. (Elmer Littlejohn and Eric Coleman) are scheduled for Trial on 02/18/2014 for Breaking and Entering and Criminal Damaging with all four cities. A prison sentence is expected. Updates to follow...
- On August 24, 2014, a female reported she was forced into the woods at gunpoint and raped. Through investigation (Montana Hudson) was arrested and charged with Rape, Kidnapping, Agg Robbery, Having Weapons Under Disability, Disrupting Public Service, and Agg Theft. His SENTENCING is scheduled for 02/24/2015 and he is expected to receive a PRISON SENTENCE from between 15 to 25 years.
- On August 30, 2014, multiple fights were reported to the parking lot of Mr. Gee's. A female was arrested and charged with Felonious Assault after striking another female in the head with a broken beer bottle. The victim continues to receive cosmetic surgery to repair the scarring. Trial is set for 03/11/2015. Updates to follow...
- On September 04, 2014, Enterprise Rent-A-Car reported employee theft of a gas credit card in the amount of \$15,460.85. Pretrial is set for 02/04/2015 at County Court.
- On September 16, 2014, Officers responded to a frantic female advising she was assaulted by her ex-husband in her home. Through investigation, Johnathan Harrell was arrested and charged with Rape, Kidnapping, Domestic Violence, Endangering Children, Disrupting Public Service and Theft. His FINAL PRETRIAL is set for 02/11/2015 at 0900 hrs. Updates to follow...
- On September 18, 2014 a neighbor reported a possible stolen vehicle in the carport at 22850 Rockside Road. Through investigation it was learned the car was entered stolen out of Cleveland, and two males wearing hoodies, gloves, and wiping their fingerprints from the vehicle were arrested and charged with felony RSP of the motor vehicle. The backseat female passenger was arrested. Through further investigation it was learned the female and one of the males were boyfriend and girlfriend and were living together; while the second male was a friend to the boyfriend. A functioning and operable pistol was located inside the car and through interviews it was learned the plan was to use the gun and car to rob a First Merit Bank in Mayfield Heights. All subjects were charged with felony RSP of the Motor Vehicle, Conspiracy, CCW, and possession of criminal tools. On 11/20/2014, Dulaney was sentenced to (8) eight months at L.C.I. and the state ordered the pistol and the criminal tools forfeited. Sharpe was sentenced to (9) nine months at L.C. I. and Ashford was sentenced to (1) one year of Community Control Sanctions with the Adult Probation Dept.

- On September 19, 2014, a report of burglary and possession of criminal tools by (2) two black males was reported at 603 Belle. Through investigation it was learned, (Wesley Letcher and Cory Lopez) involved and charged with Burglary and Possession of Criminal Tools. Trial is set for both males on 02/10/2015.
 - On October 15, 2014, a resident reported being the victim of fraud after attempting to register her child for school. Through further investigation it was learned (Danny Heaggans) and his brother (Jayson Ramone Heaggans) were using social media to fraudulently rent unoccupied and abandoned houses in the Bedford, Garfield Heights, and Maple Heights areas. Both males are scheduled for Pretrial at The County Court on 02/04/2015. They are charged with multiple counts of Burglary and Theft. Updates to follow...
 - On October 24, 2014, several callers reported shots fired in the area of 57 Paul Street. Through investigation it was learned a 20-year old male back seat passenger fired off a semi auto handgun into the air after verbally arguing with several other people in the parking lot of St. Mary's Church and left the area. The male (Derek Decluet) was charged with RSP and Improperly Handling a Firearm in a Motor Vehicle. His pretrial is set for 02/17/2015 and he has applied for Pretrial Diversion. Updates to follow...
 - On October 27, 2014, a wife reported her husband struck her in the face. (Lee Anthony Williams) was charged with Felony Domestic Violence due to prior Domestic Violence convictions and a CCH for Rape, GSI, and Importuning in 2005. He is a registered sex offender with County since 2008. Pretrial set for 02/10/2015 in County Court. Updates to follow...
 - On November 17, 2014, reports of a suspicious vehicle parked in the driveway of her home. Through further investigation (Mark Anthony O'neal Price) was found sleeping in the car. He was charged with Having a Weapon Under Disability, Improperly Handling a Weapon in a Motor Vehicle, Drug Trafficking, Drug Possession, and Possession of Criminal Tools. His case is set for PRETRIAL on 03/03/2015. He has a long history of drugs and weapons offenses. Updates to follow...
 - On November 19, 2014, the parents of a female juvenile reported a 40 year old male neighbor is allowing their daughter to spend time at his home when she should be in school. Through further investigation it was learned Victor Pryor was having a sexual relationship with the girl since she was fifteen years of age. He was arrested and charged with Unlawful Sexual Conduct with a Minor, and Interference with Custody. His case was set for Pretrial on 02/02/2015 and is currently pending a Trial Date. Updates to follow...

- On November 30, 2014, Live-In girlfriend to (Karlos Keelan Norman) reported he came home drunk, threw her into the wall, and choked her

around the neck. He was arrested and charged with Felony DV due to prior DV convictions, Federal Probation, and a Felony DV conviction. Pretrial set for 02/05/2015.

- On December 04, 2014 Jay Honda reported a male purchased a car with a personal check in the amount of \$22,684.78. The check was returned on a CLOSED account. Through further investigation it was discovered the customer (David W. Hostettler) has an extensive criminal history for passing Bad Checks for Motor Vehicles in (7) different states. He has another case for the same offenses through Strongsville PD and an arraignment has been set for 02/11/2015 for Passing Bad Checks and Theft of a Motor Vehicle.

The Following Cases Provide Sentencing details

- UPDATE to the AGG ROBBERY reported at the Family Dollar Store on 10/17/2013. Martea Robinson was arrested and charged with Agg Robbery, Kidnapping, and Having Weapons Under Disability. On 08/19/2014 a JURY reached a verdict and on 08/20/2014 he was convicted of Agg Robbery with a Firearm, Kidnapping with a Firearm, and Having Weapons Under a Disability. The court imposed a prison sentence at L.C.I. for (10) Ten Years. He is ineligible for early release. Currently his attorney is appealing the conviction.
- UPDATE to GRAND THEFT MOTOR VEHICLE and PASSING BAD CHECKS on Craig's List sale of (2) Dirt Bikes, and the fraudulent check for \$5800.00 passed to the seller of the bikes. Anthony Wimberly was sentenced to L.C.I. for 13-months and restitution in the amount of \$5,000.00 was ordered and payable through the probation department. Dominic Cunningham was found guilty of RSP motor vehicle and sentenced to 90 days of probation with the Adult Probation Department. He was ordered to forfeit the 2006 Kawasaki, KX250.
- UPDATE to Burglary and Theft of property reported by a friend and landlord to (Renee Donofrio). On 09/30/2014 she was sentenced to one year of probation and ordered to pay \$15,132.00 to one victim and \$8,968.00 to another victim. Payment will be made through the probation department.
- UPDATE to Drug Possession (40 Percocet Pills) and Trafficking Case for (Cody Inman).
11/26/2014 - Found Guilty of Drug Possession (F-3) . Sentenced to L.C.I. for (9) nine months. Driver's License Suspended until 05/25/2015.

- UPDATE to Felony Passing Bad Checks (\$3,300.00 for a 2002 Volvo S60) with Toyota of Bedford. Ahmad Salti found guilty of Theft of a MV with forfeiture specs. Sentenced to L.C.I. for (8) eight months. Restitution ordered in the amount of \$3,000.00 to Toyota of Bedford. Payable through the Adult Probation Department.
- UPDATE to Bedford Medical Center UHS Police Officer who reported an E.R. patient placed both hands on his duty weapon and attempted to gain control of it. On 11/25/2014, (Jerry Dubose) was sentenced to (1) one year of supervised Medical Probation for Attempted Robbery. He is to complete an intensive outpatient program. Attend AA meetings. Refrain from use of mood altering chemicals and keep regular contact with a psychiatrist and a case manager.

The following case remains OPEN with Cuyahoga County

- Complaint No 1400146, 02/06/2014. The County Prosecutors office is currently reviewing this case for appropriate charges. The Detective Bureau will continue to follow this case. (SK)

In conclusion, the members of the Bedford Police Detective Bureau strive to efficiently and effectively investigate and complete all cases assigned to them.

Bedford City Jail
Chief Kris Nietert

The Bedford City Jail is a State approved twelve (12) day holding facility. There are six double occupancy cells, one single occupancy administrative/segregation cell, two holding cells, and one detox cell.

The jail is staffed by one full-time and three part-time corrections officers during the day. During off hours, the jail duties are handled by patrol officers. The opening of the regional dispatch center in 2015 will necessitate some change in the jail operations. This will include the addition of part-time personnel to cover the overnight hours previously monitored by the dispatchers.

Corrections officers are responsible for the booking, processing, care, and release of all persons arrested or sentenced. We do house state sentenced misdemeanors and felons for Cuyahoga County. Corrections officers also handle the WebCheck fingerprinting of job applicants requiring a background check by the State of Ohio.

Juveniles

Juvenile Offenses

During 2014, the Bedford Police Department made 162 arrests for a total of 206 charges. Of the 206 juveniles charged, 123 were males and 39 were females. There were 6 felonies and 200 misdemeanors.

In 2014, 24 traffic tickets were issued to juveniles. These consisted of moving, non-moving, equipment violations, underage tobacco, and other misc. citations.

Juveniles walking in the street, continues to be an important concern of the residents. They are very appreciative when they see the police handling this problem aggressively.

Community Diversion Program

In 2014, the Bedford Police Department continued control over the Community Diversion Program. This is a program funded through a grant with the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court. The program is designed to deal with juvenile offenders who are arrested for non-violent misdemeanor offenses that would ordinarily go unnoticed and unpunished by an already over-whelmed Juvenile Court system, but are referred to the Community Diversion Program for adjudication and sentencing.

Upon the arrest of a juvenile offender, the paper work is forwarded to the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Intake Office. The individual is checked for prior arrests. If he/she has not been arrested before and the charges fall within the parameters for Diversion, the file is returned to the department's Juvenile Diversion Coordinator. The Coordinator schedules an interview with the juvenile and his parents/guardians to determine if the juvenile would comply and benefit from the program. The Juvenile Coordinator then determines what sanctions would best suit the individual and charge. The sanctions range from writing an apology letter to doing community service. The juvenile is then scheduled to appear before a volunteer magistrate in our court. The magistrates volunteer their time and meet once a week. Our two magistrates include Bedford Attorney Sherry Pidala and Janice St. John. The magistrate hears the particulars of the case and the recommendations of the program coordinator and determines the sentence for that individual.

Most youths are placed into community service and are required to complete a pre-determined number of community service hours. Auxiliary Officers of the department oversee the community service and transport the youths as needed.

The Community Diversion Program had 15 participants in 2014 and completed 260 hours of community service.

The Bedford Police Department will continue to monitor the juvenile complaints and concerns throughout the city in 2015 and be aggressive in its enforcement.

School resource officer

Officer S. Francis #27

In September of 2014 I was assigned to Bedford High School as the school resource officer. My experiences and data are based on four months of work. During my first four months at the school relationships between myself, administration, faculty and students have grown. The relationship between the police department and the school is constantly improving and in my career I have never seen them stronger. This is due in part to a proactive approach from both the SRO/police department and the school administration. The school has taken on a zero tolerance approach on issues such as dress code violations, disorderly conduct, theft and drug abuse. Together with the SRO/police department, issues are being handled and aggressively disciplined.

I have instructed five health classes on drug and alcohol awareness. I have also instructed students on search and seizure. I currently have seven students that sit down with me regularly about different issues going on. In October of 2014 with the support of Rainbows Children's Hospital and the BHS student senate a seatbelt awareness table/booth was set up at the football game. Students signed a promise petition to wear a safety belt while in a vehicle and in return they received a small gift for their promise.

We also have an enclosed trailer and a trailer mounted generator. In 2015, we are purchasing two new Ford vehicles.

Chiefs,

During the month of December 2014 Detectives Sara and Griffis located a large marijuana grow operation inside a business at 380 Solon Rd unit 9 in the City of Bedford. Detectives located approximately 100 plants and executed a search warrant on the business as well as the home of the suspect in Solon. The suspect is currently cooperating with Detectives on this case as well as provided additional information. Detectives assisted in December Walton Hills Detective Kwiatkowski with the execution of a search warrant in Cleveland in regards to a fraudulent check written operation as well as Cleveland narcotics and Aurora PD with several heroin overdose deaths investigations indirectly linked to our communities.

As all of you know 2014 brought several changes to the narcotics unit that involved significant changes to the day to day operation of the unit. Most of these changes helped to stream line procedures such as evidence collection, storage of evidence and disposal of evidence from closed cases.

During 2014 Detectives had several significant cases that resulted in large scale narcotic and money seizures. Such examples are approximately \$62,000 taken from a now convicted heroin dealer and approximately \$50,000 taken from another suspected heroin dealer. Detectives seized over 180 pounds of marijuana from a large scale multiple county drug operation and over 70 grams of heroin from a heroin dealer who was convicted in federal court and is now serving a 9 plus year sentence in Federal prison.

During 2014 Seale Narcotics Detectives opened 87 drug investigations and closed 60 cases. Detectives further opened 68 cards that include information on other drug dealers that have not yet risen to the level of a full investigation at this time. In addition to the above seized dollar amount, Detectives sent 7 vehicles to auction and received \$17,871.85 for these vehicles. During 2014 Detectives sent 22 seized forfeited guns to auction. Atwell's was awarded the bid and paid \$3,100 to Seale Narcotics for the 22 guns. During 2014 the implement of the tow/storage fee produced \$1,970 in storage fees.
